The Edmonton Coin Club has had a problem during the past few years of declining membership and activities. It would be easy to search out the problems and lay blame but this is not the intent of your new executive. We need to look forward not backwards. During the next few months we will attempt to give the club a new look.

A meeting place has been established at the Prince Rupert School until next summer. The viability of this area as a meeting place will have to be assessed in regards to accessibility for our younger members who do not have their own transportation. In this regard the executive will attempt to make rides available to these members.

Our meeting must become attractive to hold new members and to encourage attendance. Areas that can be explored are an attractive auction of well graded material, an organized bourse, an educational segment dealing with numismatic topics of general interest and a display of materials relative to the educational topic. We of course should not forget the inter-relationship of the members as this should be the primary aim of the club. Ten meetings a year of two and a half hours are little enough time to allow the interrelationship between members that should exist in a city of this size.

A club of 200 members should be feasible with 100 of these active. A solicitation of past members by the writer as to why membership was dropped produced a variety of reasons. Your executive will be asked to look at these problems and attempt to eliminate them.

We wish to solicit your help in the revitalization of the club by attending the meetings and encouraging fellow numismatic collectors of all interests and levels to join the club.

## EXECUTIVE MEETING

Your Executive met in December to discuss ways and means of revitalizing your club. A review was made of all past and proposed future activities. A new format for our regular monthly meetings was designed. For the time being no monthly business meeting will be held as this appears to have been one of the unpopular parts of our meetings. Improvements to the Bourse, Auction and Educational features are the initial step to improving the meetings. The Spring Coin Show will not be attempted this year and all our efforts will go into a Fall Show and the Coin Week. Efforts will be made to encourage coin displays by members.

## TERMINOLOGY

The Museum of Anthropology, 6393 N.W. Marine Drive, Vancouver, B.C., will present a display between January 20 and March 15, 1981, of interest to numismatists and anyone interested in life in the ancient world.

"IMAGES OF IMPERIAL POWER" is a display of sculpture, coins, seals, keys, etc. from the Roman and Byzantine Courts.

Of particular interest to numismatists will be several marble busts of Roman Emperors and their families, accompanied by coins of these personages. Other coins will illustrate artistic development over an 800-year period of the Roman and Byzantine Empires. Some of these coins will be accompanied by their enlarged photographs.

This display is made possible by a co-operative effort by the Department of Classics of the University of British Columbia, the Royal Ontario Museum, the Menil Foundation, Houston, Texas, the Seattle Art Museum and a group of students of ancient numismatics in this area.

In addition, beginning on Thursday, January 8, 1981, the University of British Columbia will present a series of lectures entitled "AN INTRODUCTION TO GREEK COINS". This series of lectures will run to the first week of April each Thursday afternoon between 2:30 and 5:00 p.m.

The professor will be Colin M. Kraay, Past-president of The Royal Numismatic Society and, since 1975, Keeper of the Coins at the Ashmolean Museum, Oxford. Dr. Kraay is a world-recognized authority in his field and is author of several standard reference works on Roman and Greek numismatics.

Although these lectures are for students at the University, it is expected at this time that there will be a limited number of openings at this course for the general public. Information may be obtained by calling the U.B.C. Department of Classics at (604) 228 - 2889.

While Dr. Kraay is in this area he is prepared to give talks to some of the coin clubs and other organizations. The titles of the talks he has prepared for this purpose are "A 16th CENTURY COLLECTION OF ROMAN COINS" and "COLLECTING ROMAN COINS IN ENGLAND IN THE 18th CENTURY".

## TERMINOLOGY

Proof usually is a specimen striking of coinage for presentation, souvenir, exhibition or numismatic purposes. The term "proof" refers to a method of manufacture and not the condition of the coin. They are usually made from specially prepared planchets and dies and double struck on slow moving presses. Brilliant mirror like fields and sharp high relief are distinguishing traits. Frosted Proofs, Matte, and Proof-like will be dealt with later.

Numismatist and Numismatics are words that apply to our hobby and while being difficult to pronounce initially are the correct term to apply. The word is derived from the Latin word nomismat or nomisma for coin. Numismatics are described as "the study or collection of coins, tokens and paper money and sometimes related objects (as medals). Our Club could be interpreted as being misnamed as we do encourage the study of other than coins.

## TERMINOLOGY

Extra Fine (E F or X F) is a discription of the condition of a coin. A coin that has seen minimal circulation falls into this catagory. Light overall wear on the high points, excellent overall sharpness and some mint lustre are the condition controllers. We must accept that wear characteristics vary with the metal used. Obviously minimum circulation of gold or 800 silver coins will produce on EF condition, but nickel or steel coins will resist wear to the EF state for a longer period. An EF in silver usually retains a more attractive image that the same in nickel.

Meeting number three of this term went well. Frank Fy gave an interesting talk on 1859 Canadian large cents and explained the how's, why's and wherefores of the four varieties. Frank supplied a set of these coins which were placed on display. An active bourse and auction made up the rest of the evening.

Coin Week - Plans are now complete for our participation in "Canada Coin Week". We will have a display and information booth at Meadowlark Mall in west Edmonton. The display will be open all day on Saturday the 11th April. We will feature the three club displays from the Centennial Library complimented with displays on the various aspects of collecting. ## Executive Meeting

Final plans were made for Coin Week. The Annual Coin Show which could be scheduled for the Fall was discussed. The accent would be on our presenting a show that was educational with a bourse being complimentary. It was proposed that instead of a formal meeting in June that we hold a picnic for members and family's and that we look into a tour of the Mint at Fort Saskatchewan. ## Coin Grading

We have been dealing with the different levels of grading terminology in the last few newsletters and have arrived at the Very Fine grade. At this time we should stop and consider how closely recommended grading standards are followed. This writer has noted that over the past five years grading of coins for sale at various outlets have changed to the detriment of the buyer. Due to the high price differential between grades of the more difficult to obtain coins we see that there is a temptation to upgrade coins. When you come to sell your coins that may have been purchased at too high a grade you will find that the professional buyer will use strict grading standards in establishing his buy price. Often we hear from a collector of the "big deal he made in a purchase at auction" or how "insulting a price he was offered" when he attempted to sell a coin. My advise is to be familiar with correct grading procedures and inspect all coins before purchase. Trend prices are established on correct grading.

Very Fine (V.F.) Charlton's states "Very Fine" implies clear evidence of circulation with clarity of detail. The high spots are worn, but not enough to obscure the detail. Other details are generally sharp and traces of mint lustre sometimes lingers in sheltered places. This still is an attractive collectable grade of coin that looks good in a collection. Modern nickel coinage is an exception to this rule. The writer recommends an investment of five dollars in the "Charlton Grading Guide", It will be rewarding.

OPEN HOUSE: On Tuesday, the 10th, November, 1981 we will hold an "OPEN HOUSE" meeting so as to encourage members of the numismatic community to attend a meeting of our club. This is the time for all club members to attend and help make this a successful meeting. Our main theme will be to display all aspects of the collecting hobby and will expect that ALL bourse tables will have a display of some aspect of our hobby. Any other members who can put together a display and bring it down and show it are encouraged to do so. Ideas for displays could be - set displays, books on the hobby, tools of the trade and or anything that relates to the hobby. We will have on hand the club's display cases for members wishing to use them.

EXECUTIVE MEETING: A regular monthly meeting was held at Frank Fy's house on the 20th, October. The main area of concern was planning for the next year - a key part of which is to ensure that a new executive is elected at our December meeting so as to allow good continuity. Joe Bardy & John Fy are still looking for members to stand for the executive. The only qualification for these positions are that the person has an interest in the club and is willing to devote some time to its organization and promotion.

The club will organize a "Show & Bourse" for the Spring of 1982. A committee was struck to organize and promote this show. More on this later.

DIRECTIONS: The coin club meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month - September to June at 7:00 P.M. Our present meeting place is - The Cafeteria at Victoria Composite High School. This is to the right of the North entrance of the school off of 108th Avenue.

SECURITY: As our collections become more valuable we find a requirement to protect them against theft. We have talked of the recluse collector who seeks anonymity as a means of protection. Other collectors who do not wish to be a recluse put themselves in a vulnerable position where as their collections could be stolen. How do they protect their collections? Insurance does not protect the collection, it only reimburses the value of the collection if it is stolen. Insurance companies are reluctant to insure a collection unless there is reasonable security against theft and usually insist on a thorough inventory of the collection being posted with them. Your household insurance may cover a small part of your collection's value. The Canadian Numismatic Association has a form of collection insurance available to its members. If you have a collection of some value and feel that any loss would be covered by insurance, discuss it with your insurance company so as to make sure that you do have the desired coverage.

PRESIDENTS REPORT: As our Annual Meeting is due on the 8th December 1981, I would like to report on the past years activities. The club a year ago had problems in that its financial and administrative affairs were in some dismay. Continuous work by our Secretary Treasurer, Frank Fy, has cleaned up the problems and our affairs appear to be in good order. Frank will present a financial report at our meeting which will show our financial position to be good.

Since loosing one of the Northwestern Utilities facilities for our meetings we have had to change our meeting place twice. The cafeteria at Victoria Composite High School is adequate but it would be desirable to find a reasonably permanent location.

Your executive have been active in the Club's affairs and have attended what have turned out to be productive executive meetings. They should all be thanked for their collective efforts on your behalf.

The format for club meetings was changed so as to eliminate the monthly business meeting portion. Your President felt that the executive was elected to run the day to day affairs of the club, therefore, there would be little purpose in monthly business meetings. The format of bourse, educational talk and auction was developed and seems to have been well received. Bourse fees were dropped during the year to encourage participants. Educational talks were developed, proved interesting but require additional work. The coin auction is lively, is limited to low value items and could use further development. Coffee and cookies supplied by the "Peats" has been at an excellent standard.

Activities away from the club meetings were confirmed to "Coin Week" and a display at Albert Kaiser "Coin & Stamp Show". A display in one of the malls during "Coin Week" attracted good attention and all participants are to be congratulated on their efforts. I have heard good reports on the display at the "Coin and Stamp Show". Our "Open House" in November again showed a lot of effort especially in the displays. Attendance was disappointing and was effected by people again going to the wrong location. The club has decided to organize and promote a "Coin Show & Bourse" for the Spring of 1982. While a bourse is needed to attract participants we should promote the display and educational aspects of numismatics.

I would like to thank the Executive and Members for their support during the past year and hope they will continue this same support to the new executive. Limited time and other activities preclude my further involvement with the executive, except in the role of Past-President, but the club will receive my continual support.

SECURITY: Retaining our collections at home involves the risk of theft or loss by fire. We must retain some at home so we can enjoy working on and studying our collections. The use of a safety deposit box at a bank for the more valuable coins is desirable but we are usually limited by the size of the box. A safe or a lock-up in the house will deter theft but will not stop a determined crook. Dogs, burglar alarms etc., also have a deterring effect.
