FOR A MORE INTERESTING HOBBY

Whether you are an oldtime collector or a newcomer, you are probably looking for a way to make your hobby more interesting. The text that follows contains a few suggestions on some ways to do so; it's up to you to use them.

First of all, an excellent way is to diversify what you collect. For example, take on a secondary collection of numismatic material that is in a different field from you main collecting interest. This way, you will have a greater variety of numismatic material to be on the lookout for at dealers' tables at coin shows and, yes, even at Flea Markets. This diversification will be the source of more extended research about your pieces that will increase your background in numismatics, because as you will see, all the fields of numismatics have some similarities.

INTERESTING HOBBY CON'T

At last, you will have more material to show to your friends and for display at coin shows .(we will be back on that matter later)

Another interesting fact, a secondary collection will allow you to continue to have fun when you are advanced in your principal area of interest and when missing coins that are hard to find or too expensive.

There is a wide variety of fields that may fit with your primary or alternative collection. Let's mention just a few: Canadian decimal coins; coins issued by the Provinces; foreign coins; Canadian and foreign banknotes; colonial tokens; dairy tokens (milk, bread, transportation etc.); municipal trade tokens; wooden tokens; casino tokens; religious, historical and commemorative medals, medallions issued by numismatic organizations, satirico-political scripts and many others. For example, a collection grouping coins struck in different metals or with different shapes, or one banknote from each of the foreign countries constitute very interesting and educational collections, which are not expensive to build. And how great is the thrill to look for new items to add to your collection.

Another way to make your hobby more interesting is to be involved in the administration of your local or national club. There are many ways to get involved and you don't have to be on the executive to do so. You can submit texts for publication in the monthly newsletter, or give some help with promotional activities and coin shows. Why not prepare and exhibit for your coin show? You can't imagine the satisfaction you will get from it

Another excellent way to make your hobby more interesting is to meet with other collectors with whom you can trade some coins and share ideas, and who will possibly become true friends. This can be done at the local, regional or national level. For myself, I use every opportunity to participate in meetings and meet with people. It's what I consider the most important part of a show, more especially at the annual CNA Convention when there is the occassion to meet with friends from all across the country and from the States, most of them we see once a year. Everyone is happy to attend this formal and informal meeting to review old friends and to meet new faces. Those who have had the pleasure to participate at such meetings know the fun it represents. Why don't you join us in Hamilton this summer....

So, I hope that these few suggestions will help you to make your hobby more interesting and don't forget, we have a meeting together in Hamilton, Ontario, on July 21 - 21, 1994 for the annual Canadian Numismatic Association Convention. Hope to see and meet with you there!

(Editor's Note-Thanks to Jerry and Yvon for this article. They requested it be published in our newsletter and I was happy to do so. There are many interesting suggestions on ways to improve the hobby and increase your participation. I especially liked the suggestion of members providing articles for the newsletter! A LOOK BACK - EDMONTON COIN CLUB 1954 - 1994

As discussed in the last issue (February's) I left off with a comment on the status of the Club's leather bucks. It seems Dan Sandulak had not quite cornered the market on them, as Peter Walusko, past member and current owner of Mayfair Jewellrey and Coin, still has several copies. Peter indicates he is selling them for \$20.00, but you may be able to talk him down.

The executive for 1970 was as follows:

- President J. Wray Eltom
- Vice-president George Chichak
- Secretary Treasurer Rod Banks

The Club shows were called "Coin-A-Rama's" and once again a committee was selected to put on a show. Tickets were sold for \$0.50 each or 3 for a dollar and the following prizes were offered:

- 1. 50 only Manitoba 1970 dollars
- 2. 1- 1967 Proof like Medallion set
- 3. 1- 1967 Proof like set
- 4. 1- 1970 Proof like set
- 5. 1- Canadian Prime Minister's Medallion set

The centennial project display cases had new plaques affixed that year with the inscription "Centennial Project - Courtesy of Edmonton Coin Club. Est. 1954". The cases were put on display at the Klondike Smoke and Souvenir Shop to advertise the show.

In 1971 the club President was once again Wray Eltom. That year the club hosted the 9th Annual Coin Show on October 9 at the Corona Hotel. This year the club placed the centennial exhibits in the main branch of the Royal Bank of Canada, and received the approval of many of the patrons of the bank.

Much of the information obtained for these articles have been from old newsletters and CNA bulletins. Unfortunately we do not have copies of all the newsletters and some holes are missing. Hopefully by the end of the year, I'll have a clearer picture of the events of the Club and possibly be able to put together a more detailed and concise record of the history of the Club.

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

A NICKELS WORTH OF FRAUD AND MYSTERY

There has never been a series of United States coins in numis-matic history like that of the Liberty head nickel. The first and last issues have been surrounded by controversy, shady dealings, and attempts to defraud the public. This series has troubled two centuries.

The idea for the Liberty head series was born sometime during 1880, when the shield nickel was but 14 years old. It was in that year that Charles E. Barber first created the design. It took two years of experimenting and persuading but in 1883 the first Liberty Head nickel was struck.

The design followed the then prevalent tradition of carrying the designer's likeness of Liberty on the obverse. In this case, the crowned Liberty faced left and is surrounded by 13 stars along the edges, representing the 13 original colonies. The date is found below the profile. The main feature of the reverse was a large Roman numeral "V", used to designate the denomination as being 5 cents. The "V" is surrounded by a wreath of agricultural products which in turn is surrounded by the legends, E PLURIBUS UNUM and THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. The word "cents" was omitted which proved to be a costly error.

As soon as the new coin appeared, unscrupulous people, noting the absence of the word "cents", quickly seized the opportunity to make a fast buck. Plating the coin with gold they passed it off as a 5-dollar gold piece. With the newness of the design, the size being the same, and the gold coloring, the coin fooled many a busy clerk. Later in the year the mint added the word "CENTS" to the design to prevent further attempts of fraud. The word "CENTS" was placed where E PLURIBUS UNUM was and the latter was pushed to an inconspicuous place above the "V".

The years that followed the initial issue passed without any further undue occurrences to mar the series. However, in 1913, the spectre of dishonesty again haunted the series. In 1913, the design of the nickel was going to change to the buffalo version. The mint, however, in case the buffalo design was scrapped, prepared dies for a 1913 Liberty Head nickel. The buffalo nickel went through and the Liberty Head dies were locked up for good, or so they thought.

A NICKELS WORTH OF FRAUD AND MYSTERY (Cont'd)

In 1919, an ad appeared in "The Numismatist" offering to buy 1913 Liberty Head nickels, and in 1920, Samuel Brown came up with five of them. No-one could explain their existence and Brown, who was an exmint employee was suspected of creating the five nickels himself. Whatever the case, the controversy is still raging and it will probably never be resolved.

This series, even with its derogatory history has done much to further the cause of numismatics. When the word "CENTS" was added to the nickel in 1883, many people hoarded the "centless" coins as oddities. Who knows how many new collectors were started in this way. The 1913 Liberty Head nickel has also helped. B. Max Mehl, the "Grand Old Man of Numismatics", ran ads offering 50 dollars for one. These ads spurred many a person to look through his change. How many collectors began in this way?

Whatever the case, the Liberty Head nickel series has served its purpose well. It was a successful issue for 30 years and it sparked the interest of many into becoming collectors. For this we should be grateful.

BRITISH 1933 PENNY POSES A MYSTERY

Among the famous rarities in British coinage is the 1933 bronze penny of George V. Unlike other coins which have achieved rarity through loss, destruction or the natural attrition in numbers that comes over a period of years, the 1933 penny was born rare.

Only six were struck, according to mint records; of these, four are said to have gone into cornerstones while two were retained by the mint.

Through the years a small mystery has developed around the coins. A British numismatic writer points to the claim of London coin dealers that three other 1933 pennies exist beyond the mint's recorded six. The extra three are supposedly in private collections. The supposition may or may not have gained a degree of confirmation from a story that made the rounds a year or two ago, a story that a London youth had put a 1933 penny on the market after receiving it as a gift from his coin collecting uncle. A Royal Mint authority was quoted as saying the coin was worth a small fortune. But there the story ended. A similarly undetailed story of about 15 years ago had a 1933 penny in circulation, placed there by someone who had no knowledge of its value.

And what would its value be -- if there were one? Well, several years ago when a fake 1933 penny showed up in London, dealers said a genuine George V penny of that year could be worth anywhere up to \$80,000.00.

Krause's World Coins list the coin as 8 known, but no price given - just very rare. Until one of these coins is offered on the market, a true price cannot be quoted.

Then when the mint records indicate only six being struck and other records say eight - we'll let you be the judge.

Is there an extra 1933 British penny at large? If so, where? And what's it worth?

You pays your penny and you takes your choice.


