MONEY ON MEDIUM OTHER THAN PAPER

EDITORS NOTE: In October 1994, Lub Woijtiw presented a talk and display of one of his many interests, Money on Medium other than Paper. Using overheads, he went through a variety of notes of various materials from Jute to aluminum. The display was fascinating and educational as most members were not aware of this aspect of "paper" money and had not seen this extensive a variety of non-paper notes. The following is a recap of his overhead notes as well as some Xerox copies of some of the notes. Unfortunately, the copies cannot show the details and intricacies of some of the delicate notes. We present this for those not in attendance as well as those who were not able to make notes and may possibly wish to pursue this aspect of 'paper' money collecting. These notes usually start at \$100 and up and are hard to find and are sought after by many European collectors.

MONEY

Money has three main uses:

- .1 medium of exchange
- .2 unit of account
- .3 store of wealth

PRE-20TH CENTURY - ODD AND CURIOUS FORMS

- Rock salt money of Asia and Africa
- Brick tea money of Mongolia, Tibet and Siberia
- Bamboo money of China
- Spear cross of the Congo
- Copper cross of the Congo
- Shoe and boat shaped silver coins of China
- Bullet and "pack saddle" coins of Siam
- Wire money of Arabia
- Cowrie shells used in Africa, Asia and Australia
- Fishhooks in Northwest coast of North America
- Trade beads in Africa
- Miniature Tools (eg. spade, hoes and knives in China) as early as 1100 B.C.
- Stone money of the Island of Yap

(stone weighing 180 lbs = 10,000 coconuts

- = 1/4 Acre of land
- = 18 foot boat
- = one wife)

WAMPUM

Wampum is an American Indian word for purple or white beads made from shells

- used mainly near the Atlantic coast
- used to record
 - -white wealth, peace and riches
 - purple grief, sympathy

The first wampum was used by Algonquian Indians about the year 1600. Dutch and English colonists, who had few metal coins, adopted wampum as money. However, wampum began to lose its value during the mid-1600's, when new metal coins began to appear.

During the 1700's, colonists manufactured wampum themselves for use in the fur trade with the Great Plains and Northwest Coast Indians.

20TH CENTURY ISSUES

In the 20th Century, numerous material was used as money:

- 1. JUTE glossy fibre from either of two East Indian plants
 - used chiefly for sacking, burlap and twine
 - notes were issued by Bielefeld in (Westfalia Germany) 1923, in denominations of 1000 and 5000 marks.
- 2. LINEN Cloth made from fibres of the flax plant
 - cloths have been found in pre-historic sites in Switzerland.
 - also used by Egyptians ~ 7000 years ago

Notes issued: 1860 Warnsdorf (Bohemia) 10Kr.

- 1870 Genoa, Italy 50 cent.
- many between 1917-1923 Bielefeld (Westfalia)
- **3. SILK** Lustrous, tough and elastic fibre produced by silk worms and used for textiles
 - discovered about 2700 B.C. in China

Some Notes Issued: 1794-1900 - France, Denmark,

Prussia, Sweden, Bohemia, USA and China

- 1918 1919 Chiwa Republic (USSR)
- the majority from 1921 23 by Bielefeld.
- **4. VELVET-** clothing and upholstery fabric characterized by a short soft dense pile.

Notes issued: Bielefeld (Westfalia) - 1923 in gold units, Linden (Hannover) - 1920.

- 5. LEATHER flexible material made from the skin of animals.
 - used by Egyptians over 3000 years ago.

Notes issued: 1810 - 1831 Baltics

1818 - 1825 Alaska - Russian issue

1848 - 1849 Brux, Bohemia

1922 Osterwieck am Harz (Prov. Sachsen)


1923 Paderborn (Westfalia) - white leather

1923 Possneck (Thuringen)

- **6. ALUMINUM -** issued by Lautawerk (Brandenburg) in 1922 and Teningen (Baden) in 1923.
- 7. GELATIN issued by Neufelden (Austria) in 1920 10 Heller
- 8. LINOLEUM issued in Munchen (1920) 1 and 2 Pfg.
- 9. PORCELAIN 1770 Siam
 - 1920 21 many throughout Germany (eg. Sachsen)
- 10. QUARTZ issued in GOTHA (Thuringen) in 1920
- **11. GLASS** issued in 1922 in Maffersdorf (Bohemia), private issue of four denominations.
- **12. COAL** issued in 1922 by Rootherback (Bayern), three denominations of 100, 500 and 1000 Marks.




