### **OCTOBER MEETING MINUTES**

October's meeting saw 25 members and 1 guest in attendance. Joe welcomed those in attendance and he gave a short report on the status of the CNA Convention Committee. The main item was the Convention Inn has been confirmed as the host Hotel. Final details are being worked out but the main objective of no meeting space costs have been achieved.

Our guest speaker was Ray Neiman, who gave an interesting talk and display on Medallic collectibles. As most of these items have been minted by Mints such as the Pobjoy and Wellings Mints (later bought by the Franklin Mint), there initial costs are usually quite high and many are overproduced. The secondary market sees a much cheaper price for these items, although most are well struck and of interesting topics. One set shown was by the Wellings Mint, of a set entitled the Scarlet Horseman on the RCMP. The set was issued in 1973 and consisted of 48 pcs each in bronze & silver. An RCAF set in bronze was also shown as well as Banks of the World. This set consisted of 50 pieces in silver and bronze with 1000 grains of silver in each piece. A medallic history of Canada was produced . . . 2

in 2 volumes of 100 pcs in bronze. A 150 piece set of The Great Explorers of Canada in sterling silver was also shown. Sets with medals and first day covers were also issued. A contemporary restrike of the Kings of England set, minted in the 1820's or 30's was also shown. The set consisted of 40 pieces in pewter. Several questions were asked of Ray who received alot of these types of items in his store. Ray was thanked for his presentation then went on to his next job of conduction the auction. A recap of the prices realized is included in this newsletter. The meeting concluded with an interesting ANA video on "Banknote Curiosities". The attendance door prize draw of a 1990 US silver dollar was won by Jules Rach.



# 1998 CNA MEDAL DESIGN CONTEST

### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

- 1. THIS IS A CONTEST TO DESIGN THE REVERSE OF THE MEDAL TO BE STRUCK TO COMMEMORATE THE 1998 ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE CANADIAN NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION. THE CONVENTION IS BEING HELD IN EDMONTON, ALBERTA, FROM JULY 29 TO AUGUST 2, 1998.
- 2. A PRIZE WILL BE AWARDED FOR THE BEST REVERSE DESIGN SUBMITTED TO THE COMMITTEE. DESIGNS SELECTED SHALL BECOME THE PROPERTY OF THE CANADIAN NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION.
- 3. DRAWINGS SHOULD BE IN BLACK AND WHITE ON STIFF CARDBOARD AND 100mm (4") IN DIAMETER. THE FINISHED MEDAL WILL BE CIRCULAR AND ABOUT 40mm IN DIAMETER.
- 4. A DESCRIPTION OF THE MEDAL DESIGN SHOULD BE WRITTEN ON THE REVERSE OF THE CARD, WITH YOUR NAME AND ADDRESS. ALL SUBMISSIONS BECOME THE PROPERTY OF THE MEDAL COMMITTEE.
- 5. DESIGNS SHOULD REFLECT THE LOCATION AND CHARACTER OF THE CONVENTION. IT SHALL CONTAIN THE YEAR, THE NAME OF THE HOST CLUB, THE WORDS "CNA ANNUAL CONVENTION", AND THE LOCATION OF THE CONVENTION.
- 6. <u>CLOSING DATE FOR ENTRIES WILL BE APRIL 1, 1997</u>. THE CONVENTION MEDAL COMMITTEE WILL SELECT THE WINNING DESIGNS, BUT IS UNDER NO OBLIGATION TO USE ANY OR ALL OF THE DESIGNS SELECTED.

#### CNA Annual Convention - 1979 - Edmonton CNA-26

The Chateau Lacombe in Edmonton was the site of the 26th Convention with the Edmonton Coin Club acting as host. The Convention took place from July 16th to 21st The J. Douglas Ferguson gold medal was awarded to Larry Gingras. Harold Don Allen received the RCM Award for Numismatic Education. The Convention medal's reverse was designed by J. Wray Eltom It depicts Fort Edmonton (1904) and the current day downtown Edmonton skyline. The medal was struck by the Metal Art Co , of Rochester New York. The reverse die is in the CNA Archives

In response to your question, we found your web page via a search on the words "bi-metal". As it turns out, one section of your web site has a bi-metal coin list. In the last month about 12 individuals have joined together to form a world wide bi-metallic coin club. To date we have representation from 5 countries. In our quest to research the marketplace for these coins we ran across your site. This site is interesting and a good starting place for a novice, but represents probably only 60%-70% of the bi-metallic coins which have been produced over the last 10-15 years when you consider circulating and non-circulating coins from official and unofficial mints. Our club is still in the start-up stages and utilizes principally e-mail, but we are looking at creating a web site. Yours would be a very nice model to follow. Please pass along the following bi-metal list to Mr. Kindrake. I think it will greatly enhance the one he has already. A few of my fellow members who are more exacting would say that even this list is incomplete, because I have not included the various combinations of uncirculated, proof and multiple mint marks and packaging techniques that may exist relative to each issue. I find it challenging enough to collect one of each major type, country and year without trying for all the various varieties and error coins which may be found. I have included a couple of listings with multiple mint marks and variations simply because I happened to be able to add them easily to my collection. Several of the "club" members are accumulating a very large number of bi-metal medals and tokens as well. I have included only 2 or 3 of those where I though they were significant in being test coins for actual production runs of circulating bi-metal coinage. If anyone is interested I know that a member of the United States TAMs club has published a US bi-metal token book which catalogs about 1400 pieces from the 1600s to the present. I could provide the publishers address if there is any interest.

1. Hot Bi-metallic news......By Frans Dubois, The Netherlands

Austria has made in the past a 500 (1995) and a 1000 (1994) Shilling Bi-metallic coin. Now there is a roumer that there is a 50 Shilling 1996 Bi-metallic circulation coin. No conferming yet.

2. More Hot Bi-metallic news......By Larry Friemel, USA

Isle of man has this year 1996 made some nice, expencive Bi-metallics.

The 'Legend of King Arthur' is a five coin set which has been approved by Buckingham Palace and bears an effigy of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on the obverse with a different reverse on each of the five coins. The reverse designs depect King Arthur, Queen Guinevere, Camelot Castle, Merlin the Wizard and Sir Lancelot. There are two Bi-metallic 5 coin set being offered by Pobjoy Mint Limited, Great Brittain. The five coins in each of the two sets are as follows:

Set 1 -- Proof, 1/4-oz, Bi-metallic, 999.9 fine gold ring & 995.0 fine

Platinmum center, 22 mm diameter.

Set 2 -- Proof, 1/4-oz, Bi-metallic, 995.0 fine Platinmum ring & 999.9

fine gold center, 22 mm diameter.

Each of the five coin sets is being offered at \$ 1275 US from Pobjoy's Milwaukee, WI distributor or for 199 pounds, each directly from England.

How the toony (the Canadian 2 \$ Bi-metallic coin) got its nickname. The story starts in 1987. In that year it has decided to replace the \$ 1 bank notes by \$ 1 coins as this is cheaper in the long run. A coin is more expensive to produce than a bank note but a coin lasts much, much longer. Originally it was decided to have on the reverse of the \$1 coin the familiar scene of two man in a canoe first used for the silver dollar of 1935. It was also decided to make the coin 11-sided and yellow in colour. The round nickel dollars, struck since 1968 were rarely seen in circulation. The master dies for the new \$ 1 coin were shipped, by courier, from Ottawa to the mint in Winnipeg but got lost (stolen?). Therefore it was decided to drop the design with the canoe (to prevent to production of fake coins?) and replace it by a design consisting mainly of a loon (scientific name: Gavia immer; known as "great northern diver" in the UK, "ijsduiker" in Dutch, "Eistaucher" in German, and "plongeon imbrin" in French), a popular bird seen on Canada's lakes and known for its haunting calls. Shortly after this coin was introduced, people started to call it "loony" (crazy) because of the image of the loon. In 1996 when the \$ 2 Bi-metallic coin was introduced, some people suggest the nickname of "doubloony", a combination of "doubloon" and "loony". As most of you know probably, the doubloon is a famous Spanish golden coin with a face value of 2 Ducats. However, most people prefer the nickname of "toony" which is a contraction of "two" and "loony". If the master dies for the 1987 \$ 1 coin were not lost, the 1996 \$ 2 Bi-metallic coin would never have been called "Tooney"!

9. Tri-metallics, correct name ??.....By Martin Peeters

When you look to the word Tri-metallic it should say there are three metalls used in these kind of coins. But that's not always true. Tri is given to these coins because they are made with 2 rings and 1 center (or 1 ring and 2 centers). Till now there are 2 countries who have made Tri-metallic coins: France, 20 Francs in different years and with different types and Monaco, 20 Francs only in 1992.

10. Czech Republic, 50 Korun Bi-metallic.......By Martin Peeters The Czech Republic has made a 50 Korun Bi-metallic in 1993, 1994, 1995 and 1996. The last 3 years they are only available in a Mintset. The 50 Korun Bi-metallic is a special one. When you look to the metalls, Ring Brass plated Steanless steel and Center Cupper plated Steanless Steel, there is nothing special. When you look to the colors; Ring RED (Brass) and plug YELLOW (Cupper) then there is no Bi-metallic in the World who has this combination of these two colors. The 50 Korun Bi-metallic is very difficult to obtain. I've got them directly from the Czech Republic for a (set)price of 15 US Dollars. 11. Cape Verde, odd Bi-metallic ??......By Martin Peeters

Cape Verde has made 3 Bi-metallic coins in 1994. These three 100 Escudos have different picture on the observe side: one with a ship, one with flowers and one with a bird. When you look to the metalls, cupper ring (red colored) and Nickel center (white colored) there is nothing odd. But when you look to it's shape: The ring is shaped at the outside with 10 angles. These Bi-metallic are the only ones with that shape.


