BRITISH ROYAL MINT ISSUES A MEDAL SHOWING THE RMS TITANIC

In 1998, the British Royal Mint issued a 38.45mm medal in semi-proof condition in nickel-brass to commemorate the ship, the RMS Titanic. Harland & Wolff, the company who constructed the ship at Belfast, Ireland, gave the British Royal Mint the commission to make the medal and distribute it.





The RMS titanic belonged to the White Star Line Steamer Company. On

April 10, 1912, it departed from Southampton, England, on its maiden voyage, bound for New York, with more than 1,300 passengers and 900 crew on board. The Titanic was 882.5 feet long (nearly the length of three football fields), 92.5 feel wide and 100 feet high (11 stories). It weighed 46,328 tons.

At 11:45 p.m. on April 14, 1912, the Titanic hit an iceberg 531 km southeast of Newfoundland. Two hours and 35 minutes later, at 2:20 a.m. on April 15, 1912, the ship sank to the ocean floor, 2.5 miles below, breaking into two pieces just before sinking.

There were only 16 lifeboats with a total capacity for 1,178 persons. Some lifeboats left not filled to capacity. 1,513 lives were lost and 711 people were saved in lifeboats, being picked up by the Carpathia four hours after the Titanic sank. The Titanic had given the incorrect position of its location to the Carpathia and so the latter was delayed in finding the lifeboats.

The Titanic was traveling at the dangerously high speed of 22 knots (41 km/hour), in an area where icebergs had been reported by other ships. The Titanic slid along the side of a large iceberg, which tore a hole in its metal plating, about 295 feet long, starting somewhat beyond the bow of the ship and ending near its center. This hole punctured five of the ship's sixteen watertight comparments, one more compartment than the safety margin allowed, to keep the ship afloat. Gradually, the other compartments filled with water and the ship sank.

Other contributing factors to the sinking of the Titanic were that the quality of the steel plates that formed the outer part of the ship, while of good quality for 1912, were not of the higher quality of today's steel and also that the ice cold water weakened the steel. Furthermore, it is believed that the central part of the rivets that held the steel plates together, were made of substandard material, so that when the ship slid along the side of the iceberg, which tore a hole 295 feet long in it, the rivets sheared or broke under pressure instead of bending.

The obverse side of the medal shows the RMS Titanic on April 10, 1912, at its departure from Southampton, England. "RMS/TITANIC" is below.

The reverse side shows the flag and at the bottom the emblem of Harland & Wolff, who constructed the Titanic and also the flag of the White Star Line Steamer Company, who purchased the ship from Harland & Wolff. "WHITE STAR LINE" is engraved at the left and "HARLAND & WOLFF" at right.

The medal is not dated.

The medal is available in a descriptive cardboard holder for \$39.95 plus \$5.95 for postage, plus 7% GST from British Royal Mint, P.O. The Reverse description, Outer Ring - has 'EDMONTON NUMISMATIC SOCIETY' on the top, and 'CELEBRATING OUR 45th ANNIVERSARY' on the bottom. The Centre Plug has 'REDEEMABLE BY THE E.N.S. FOR \$2.00 EXPIRES JAN 1, 2000'.

This token, which is redeemable for \$2.00 by the ENS up to Jan. 1, 2000, is the first Bi-Metallic token to be issued by a Coin Club, as far as the Worldwide Bi-Metallic Collectors Club knows. We will be producing 400 pieces for sale as follows:

I thought it very appropriate if we used the slang term Tanner for this issue. I am sure that most of us are familiar with this term, but in any case, I hope all will read on....

The British sixpence ceased to be legal tender early in July of 1980 after 429 years of minting.

During its long career, this silver coin was one of Britain's favourites. Generations of Britons sang, "I've got Sixpence, jolly, jolly, Sixpence". Millions of bets were settled by the flipping of this coin and countless children found one under their pillow after they had lost a tooth.

The old English tradition of putting coins in the Christmas pudding was another use for the popular coin. Woolworth chain in Britain were built on the Sixpence, -- in America, the stores are known as the dime stores. The coin became famous in story and song. It was featured in everything from old fash-

ioned music halls to stage shows and movies.

At its conception in 1551, the Sixpence was a mighty thing, enough to pay a man's wages for a month. By its end, it had shrunk to a lowly 2.5 pence in the new decimal coinage, worth about 5 cents.



It is estimated that there are still 140 million coins still in existence. Many will be returned to the mint to be melted down. Those who hang onto them in the hopes of getting rich, his hope seems very remote. Still there are those who will put away a few for sentimental reasons. It may take sev-

eral generations before all the old adages of the coin are forgotten. Information sources refer to tanner as a British Sixpence, origin unknown. Not even the British Royal Mint knew why the Sixpence was dubbed the "Tanner" in British slang. One theory is, that it was named for a mint employee named Tanner. After all these years it is unlikely the truth will ever be known.

Britiain's beloved Tanner is dead, but the memory will linger on. *********
