<u>JANUARY MEETING</u> <u>MINUTES</u>

Twenty-three (23) members attended the February "Valentines" meeting. Dan welcomed all in attendance. The main speaker was Bob Ericksson, who gave an informative talk on Canadian 1 cent coins. Bob's collection is of high quality, with some of the highest grades known. The discussion included the mintage numbers of various years and the correspond-

ing population report in mint state condition. Bob provided a handout for the members. (ICCS Jan. 2000) The review included Q.E. II and George VI. Also, varieties and scarcity were discussed with large blow-up handouts of the 1948 & 1949 varieties (pointing to and off of the denticles) Also varieties for '53, '54 & '55 "No Serif"-shoulder fold to denticle and "Serif" - no shoulder fold between denticle. All in all a very interesting and informative talk. Dan reviewed the status of the upcoming show, and asked for members to volunteer their time to set-up and tear down, as well as man the tables. Thanks to those who volunteered. At show and tell, Norm Mitchell, who turned 86 recently, recounted how Wray Eltom once gave him a 1915 3 Pence to commemorate his birth year. And Terry Cheesman on a recent ancient coin acquisition from 220AD. Maurice Doll announced the museum has put a small permanent display of crowns by the cafeteria, of material donated by Lorne K. 
ENS SHOW UPDATE


Medieval coins

We'll begin with a little History lesson . . .


Medieval European coinage was standardized by Charlemagne around 800 AD when he conquered most of Europe. The standard Denier (Penny in English, Pfennig in German, Denaro in Italian) was a silver coin about the size of a US penny. Historians have suggested that its value at the time was about that of a meal or a pitcher of ale. For the next 4-500 years, most coinage in Europe followed this standard pattern. Most Medieval coins incorporate a cross somewhere into the design. German and other eastern regions often incorporate an eagle into the design while English coins generally carry a crude portrait of the King, which is a distinction that remains to this day (now Queen Elizabeth). French coins will often show a monogram, castle, or cathedral.

Medieval history is fascinating as it is quite chaotic. From the disintegration of Charlemagne's empire in the mid to late 10th century, the region of what is now modern-day France emerges as an incredibly complex web of feudal states, ruled by Counts and Dukes who owed nominal allegiance to the King who in reality was often less powerful than his subjects. This is the feudal era where political intrigue and complex inter-familial relationships lead ultimately to the mess called the Hundred Years War (1337-1451). The coinage of this time is very complex as well. Every Count or Duke had his own mint, as it was a very profitable enterprise. The variety of these coins, while adhering to the basic Denier style, is staggering. There are literally thousands of varieties.

Different grades of Medieval coins




Crusader Coins



This is the "Crac de Chevaliers" or Castle of the Knights. It is a European style castle built during the Crusades in what is now Syria. Many examples of these Crusader castles remain in the Levant to this day.


The Crusades were a series of military expeditions that continued on and off for several hundred years from 1086 until about the 14th century. Over twenty "official" Crusades were launched, with varying degress of success. Once the European invaders established themselves in and around the Holy Land, they began to mint coinage. Not surprisingly they styled their coinage after that which they already knew and utilized similar styles in an effort to confirm their legitimacy. What follows are some coins from Crusader states established in what is now Greece and parts of Turkey. There is also Crusader coinage that was minted in Jerusalem, but that generally commands a higher price given the general public's great historical interest in that city.

Isabella de Villehardouin - Princess of Achaea 1297-1301




This is a billon Crusader denier of Isabelle de Villehardouin who ruled as Princess of Achaea from 1297 - 1301. (Achaea was in what is now Greece and was "on the way" to the Holy Land) The obverse states + YSABELLA P*ACH (Isabella, Princess of Achaea) surrounding a short cross. The reverse shows the "Castle Tournois" surrounded by *DE CLARENCIA (of Glarentza). This is one of the few medieval coins minted under female authority. This is in G toVG (Good to Very Good) condition.

Charles II of Anjou - Prince of Achaea 1285-1289




This is a billon Denier Tournois issued by Crusaders in Greece during the 13th century. Greece was essentially overrun by Crusaders on their way to the Holy Land during this period, and several principalities were established and ruled by French nobles. This coin was minted by Charles II of Anjou who ruled as Prince of Achaea from 1285-1289. The obverse shows a cross surrounded by the legend + KH PRINC AChS. The reverse shows a Castle (see the Louis IX above) surrounded by + DE CLARENTIA (of Glarentza - where the mint was). This coin is in VG/F (Very Good to Fine) condition.

William de la Roche - Grand Duke of Athens 1280-1287



This is a billon Crusader denier from William de la Roche, Grand Duke of Athens from 1280-1287. The obverse legend states + G DVX ATENIS (Grand Duke of Athens) surrounding a short cross, while the reverse shows the "Castle Tournios" surrounded by THEBE CIVIS (City of Thebes) This coin has been "whizzed" - polished with a wire brush. This process gives it the bright "silver" color but removes the patina. Thus while it might look nice, it's actually better to leave the dark patina on the coin as a preservative against further oxidation. It is the worst condition coin on this site and would grade only G (Good). Like the other Crusader coins on this site, I picked it up for \$5 as an unknown coin. I then spent several hours poring through reference books trying to match the fields and decipher the legends with a magnifying glass. This work pushes my estimate of its value to \$10, merely because I can attribute the coin with relative certainty. Of course, it's really only worth what someone is willing to pay for it . . .

Philip of Taranto - Prince of Achaea 1306-1313



This is a coin of Philip of Taranto, Prince of Achaea from 1306-1313. This coins is in horrible condition and was probably the hardest one to finally attribute. I literally spend hours trying to identify some of the letters, then comparing them to the references and see if there were any matches. The obverse reads +PhS*ACh V_C_ surrounding a short cross. As you can see on the reverse, this coin shows the distinctive "Tournois" style. Superman will be able to read the +DE CLARENCIA legend surrounding it - I needed a magnifying glass.

Philip of Taranto was the son of Charles II of Anjou. He was given Achaea, Athens, Albania, Corfu, and Epirus by his father in 1294. He ceded Achaea in 1301 as a wedding present to Philip of Savoy and Maud of Hainault. He regained the title in 1306 when Charles II declared Philip's marriage to Maud as illegal. Philip ceded the principality once again in 1313 to Louis of Burgundy upon his marriage to Maud of Hainault. Philip died in 1331.

The reason I've included this coin is to highlight an interesting characteristic - sometime in the past a hole was drilled in this coin. As you can see, it's quite small - only the smallest of chains would fit, so I am guessing that this was sewn onto a garment. This was often done to provide adornment for a person of moderate means, not as a way to save or hide the coin.


