1921 HALF TO SELL AT TOREX

A 1921 50 Cent piece, graded PCGS MS-64 will be sold at the June 15-16 Torex auction, conducted by Moore Numismatics. The coin is described as having vibrant original lustre with light traces of gold and rainbow toning and well struck. It is believed to be one of the 3 or 4 finest known surviving business strikes. One hasn't been offered at auction in Canada for over a decade. Over 1200 certified decimal coins, 500 lots of Canadian Banknoters and 400 lots of Breton tokens, world coins, medals and banknotes highlight the 2 day sale. There will also be an additional 1400 Canadian, Newfoundland coins, tokens and banknotes from 45 collections, 80 lots of which are equal to or greater than the Norweb or Pittman auctions held previously. Cartwheels, By George





COPPER TWOPENCE

George III came to the throne of England in 1790, an illiterate and sometimes mad man. Yet, in the face of all his mental deficiencies, he was a strong nationalist and truly not the tyrant we have benn led to believe. The American Revolution was to be a contributing factor to his complete madness in his later years. The copper farthing and half penny were the only

coins minted for him in the earlier part of his reign, from 1770 through 1775. These were never favorably accepted, and most were melted to make a thinner counterfeit half penny.

In 1672 the figure of Britania was introduced to English coinage on the copper coins. Britannia was seated left, holding an olive branch in her right hand, and on her left arm rested a spear with a shield at her side. This design remained on the two coins until 1797 when, to combat counterfeiting and the use of tradesmens tokens, Matthew Boulton, an engineer, suggested the use of coins of intrinsic value. Bourlton advised a change in the farthing and half penny and coinage of a copper penny and twopence. The penny had been made of silver. To save the coin design from undue wear, he suggested a broad, raised rim with incuse inscriptions. The farthing and half penny, however, were not coined until 1799, the farthing being the first English coin to carry the denomination.

Boulton also had suggested use of a steam powered press and a retaining collar to make a more uniform piece. Conrad H. Luchler, a Flemish diecutter, engraved the design for the coins, and on June 9, 1797, the government signed a contract with Boulton for the coining of 20 tons of twopence and 480 tons of pennies. Each penny was to weigh one ounce and each topence was to weigh two pounces, making them as near as possible to their intrinsic value. Each bore the mint mark SOHO. A change in the reverse design was made, with Britannia still facing left and holding in her right hand the olive branch, but the spear on her left arm was replaced with a trident, the first time it appeared on a coin. Again for the first time, waves were indicated before Britannia, and to her right was a three masted sailing ship.

Because of the weight and size, the penny and twopence were soon to be known as "Cartwheels". More than 6000 worth of twopence were coined in 1797 and 1798, all of them dated 1797. A total of 310,885 worth of pennies were coined at the Soho mint from 1797 till 1808, with a slight change in design in 1806. Weight and size made the "cartwheel" penny and twopence of 1797 very inconvenient, and






The "Cartwheel" Penny of 1797

they were not long in circulation. This was the only copper twopence in the British series, a small silver piece being used in the Maundy sets.

With minor changes, Britannia remained on the farthing and half penny until 1937--when it was replaced with the wren and the sailing

ship--and on the penny until, with introduction of decimal coinage, she rose in rank to the 50 cent piece. The appearance of the trident in Britannia's design in 1797, along with the three masted sailing ship and the waves, is symbolic of the old English motto, "Britannia rules the waves".

Women and their Faith, Part II By Geraldine Chimirri-Russell

In Britain, Elizabeth II retains and uses the title of Defender of the Faith, FID[ei] DEF[ensor], bestowed on her ancestor, Henry VIII by Pope Leo X (October 11, 1521). This was a reward for his learned pamphlet in which he had proclaimed a profound devotion to the papacy. When Henry broke with the papacy, he was deprived of the title by Pope Paul III, but it was restored to the king by Parliament in 1544. The abbreviation Fid. Def. or the letters F.D. have appeared regularly on the coinage of British monarchs since George I.

In Britain the struggle between Catholicism and Protestantism seemed to be focused at times when there were queens on the throne. The establishment of a Reformed Church began with Henry VIII. His son Edward was raised as a Protestant. The sickly youth inherited the throne from his father and was persuaded to nominate his Protestant cousin Jane as his heir. There were no coins issued during her nine day reign.

Mary, the eldest daughter of Henry VIII, seized the throne from her cousin and immediately made efforts to bring her realm back to the Catholic Church. Although she initially showed toleration for the reformers, she became increasingly harsh and began a series of persecutions. The pace of change increased with her marriage to the most Catholic Spanish King, Philip II. Although the English would not officially allow Philip the title of King of England, coins show the queen facing her husband as equals and cited in Latin as King and Queen of England. There were many of her subjects who resented Philip's influence over her and her efforts to link England strongly to the Catholic countries of Europe. These factors and her programme of religious persecution made Mary a very unpopular monarch. She earned the epithet, Bloody Mary.

On Mary's death the throne passed to her sister Elizabeth. Elizabeth had been raised as a Protestant and her life had been in danger during her sister's reign. She survived the religious persecutions and steadily brought the realm back to the Protestant faith with herself as the Head of the Church.

Religious persecution continued to some extent during her reign, but now those who adhered to the Catholic faith were at risk.

Religious questions related to the monarch continued during the reign of the Stuarts. James II, although an avowed Catholic, married a Protestant, Ann Hyde, by whom he had two daughters. His second wife, Mary of Modena, was a Catholic, and when his son James was born it seemed likely that James II would make efforts to reinstate Catholicism by force. Efforts were made by the Protestant clergy to depose James. William of Orange, the Protestant cousin and husband of Mary, was induced to take the throne as her co-ruler. James fled to Ireland, but was defeated by William at the Battle of the Boyne. The religious unrest from this event reverberates in Ireland to the present day.

James II's two daughters, Mary and Anne, became Queens in turn, and maintained the Protestant religion in England, despite challenges from their half brother, James, and his son, Bonny Prince Charlie. When Anne died without leaving any surviving children the throne passed to the Protestant George I of the German Hanoverian line.

Queen Victoria was a Protestant who did not question her religious affiliations. However, when coins were struck in Britain during her reign without the Dei Gratia legend, there was an outcry against the "godless coins." This indicates the strength of religious feeling in the country.

Today Elizabeth II maintains a devout attitude towards her duty as the Head of the Church of England. Her son Charles has expressed a wish that the title Defender of the Faith be changed to Defender of Faith to reflect the monarch's duty to protect the many faiths of his people.





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


Ancient Roman and Greek Coins - Common Types



This is a very common copper coin minted in 333-334 AD near the end of the reign of Constantine the Great. It is worn and costs about \$10 at a show. It celebrates the foundation of a new capital city named in his honor, CONSTANTINOPOLIS, "Constantine's city." [This is the obverse legend.

You can see the suffix "POLIS" in English words referring to cities, such as metropolis."] The city is now the largest city in Turkey, named Istanbul. The obverse bust is not of Constantine, but of the city herself, personified as a helmeted warrior with a sceptre (denoting power) over her shoulder. They come in high grade for \$40 or less. The reverse shows Victory with her foot on a tiny ship's prow. It commemorates a naval battle which secured the site of the city for Constantine.



A very common Byzantine coin of Basil II and Constantine VIII, AD 976-1028. It costs about \$20 - \$30 at a show in this condition (which is well above average). The obverse shows a facing bust of Christ (with a halo) and the reverse says "Jesus Christ, ruler of kings" in Greek. Nowhere is John mentioned, which is why this type of coin is called an "anonymous" bronze.

A silver con of Alexander the Great. The obverse is a bust of Hercules in a lion-skin headdress. The reverse shows Zeus (Jupiter) seated, holding an eagle. The legend "King Alexander" in Greek begins at 8:00. This example is more worn than most -- it should cost about \$100.







A common (but not cheap) silver coin of of the Greek city **Corinth**, minted 350 - 300 BC. Pegasus (the winged horse) / head of the goddess Athena in a Corinthian helmet (tipped back to expose the face). A comucopia is behind. It is the size of a nickel, but thicker. Cost, about \$200 - \$300.



A Greek copper coin of the city Pantikapion, from the 4th century BC. Pan (notice the pun on the name of the city) / bull's head. This is good artwork for a small coin of only 16mm diameter. It costs about \$50 - \$100 in this high grade.
